We had a great lunchtime meeting on June 7, 2022, chaired by Chamber Prez Mike Carroll at Peppermints. • We welcomed Leann's guest Adam Stephens, a member of the Honeoye Falls Rotary Club and Leann's colleague from the B I networking group. Adam has been assisting with the Welcome Wagon project. • Coming up soon after our meeting date was Mike Carroll's Western New York Pottery Festival on June 18 and 19, 10:00 - 4:00 each day. As of this time, 18 artisans had been secured. On Saturday about 200 pots in the wood-fired kiln were unloaded; on both days Raku pots were available for glazing and fastfiring.

• Rebecca discussed the Avon Free Library's summer reading program to keep kids engaged during vacation time and activities for "older customers" which have evolved from knitting, mah jongg, and chess! New York State construction aid will cover the costs of redesign and reconstruction of the library building: at present, a design for backyard projects is in the works. The front stairs must be demolished, as they do not meet current code and the result will be a return to the library's original look. Rebecca is seeking candidates for two openings: a groundskeeper and a part-time clerk.

• Maureen Wheeler described the celebrations for the "nine villages...nine murals. 9th day of July" (and other dates).
