Presiding on July 11 was Mike Carroll, over a fine Peppermints lunch. Enjoying the same were Geri Brewer, Leann Hill, Robert Hunn, David Leven, Christine Quinlan, Marinda Rucinski, Bonnie Taylor-Davis, Larry Tetamore, Paul Tilly, Rene Tilly-Lyness, Robert Westfall, Steve Harrison and your secretary Barbara Herman. Joining us were guests representing the Ahrens Fox Circle Preservation Society, Richard Neth and Kerry Murray. From the Avon Central School District we welcomed Suzanne Freeman, Christina Ecklund and Erik Schneider. President Daniel Cochrane of the Avon Preservation and Historical Society joined the lunch. And a pleasure to have Betty Lou Tilly, Paul's wife, with us as well.

• Mike Carroll's first presidential duty was to present a draft of a letter of support to accompany a grant proposal, on behalf of the Avon Free Library. All Chamber members present agreed by voice vote. By motion by Bonnie Taylor-Davis, second by Marinda Rucinski, motion passed.

• Mike reported on the Western New York Pottery Festival, held June 17-18 on the grounds of his Studio Sales Pottery, 5557 East Avon Road. Attendance was up 35% over last year, and vendors reported a 30% increase in sales, both, very impressive results. Mike acknowledged assistance from Livingston County's Tourism office, matching grant monies helping with marketing and show set-up.

• Chamber Vice President Steve Harrison of the Genesee Valley Penny Saver next assumed the gavel, to introduce Richard Neth and Kerry Murray, for a presentation of the Ahrens Fox Society as identified above, with an interesting history of the "FOX", as the combination pumper has been known. Built by the Ahrens-Fox Company of Cincinnati, the pumper served Avon from 1926 until 1959. After a number of owners, the truck is now residing at the Canadian Automotive Museum in Oshawa, Ontario, but available for purchase by the Avon group, hopefully to be returned to this area as a museum and parade star. Helping in the fundraising effort to achieve this are committee members Bonnie Taylor-Davis, Dan Cochrane and Christine Quinlan. To "Bring Back the Fox" is the goal, and a total of \$55,000 to purchase and \$5,000 to move the truck to Avon is the need.
