Our August 1, 2023 lunch meeting at Peppermints was chaired by President Mike Carroll, backed up by Vice-President Steve Harrison. And joining and sharing were Geri Brewer, Leann Hill, Dave Leven, Chris Quinlan, Treasurer Marinda Rucinski, Melissa Savino, Bonnie Taylor-Davis, Paul Tilly and Ann Younger and your Secretary Barbara Herman.

• Marinda reported that Community Bank N.A. is having a "blowout special", highlighting special rates at the bank. It's time for back-to-school – or to start college life – for students, and parents will want to set up accounts. See Marinda for rates! Our Chamber accounts, Marinda reported, continue to be in healthy condition. And we thank her for keeping our books!

• Dave Leven reported for Sports Medicine Concepts (in the Matthews Bus complex in East Avon). They have completed many NFL programs for this year. In August they will stage training at Keuka College and in September will begin NBA training sessions, 40 teams contracted, to date. Following this, Dave discussed the importance of parents being aware of the need for cardiac screening for student athletes: any high school or college student planning sports participation should undergo cardiac screening. He also discussed training to enable functioning in excessive heat, such as we have experienced this year.

• Leann indicated, for her Edward Jones Financial office: she is seeking a location with higher street visibility. Site locations were offered: but she'll be glad to hear additional suggestions.

• Ann is booking into 2024 for Avon Park Theater. They will be at their customary tent during Rotary Corn Fest with more giftable items. Rhonda LaFeber has been named Assistant Curator for the museum. • Chris reported on the Opera Block restoration/remodeling project: Genesee Valley Council on the Arts has approved a grant application for the Town, for the third floor, as educational and performance space, to be applied when work is completed.
